Sermon

Silence and solitude.

One of the gifts that I was given during Sabbatical was the gift of silence for 5 days!

I often wrestle with the influences of the secular culture and even our religious subcultures that in overt or subtle ways devalue non-productive times for 'being' rather than 'doing'. The busier the better. The topic of busyness often highlights in everyday life. Conversations at social gatherings often touch upon hectic schedules, and people of all ages explain that they have been busy.

In our society we are so used to living with noise: families, television, traffic, machines, work colleagues, shops, music, phones, social media, news. We live in the age of information. And even when they are all quiet there's the busyness of my emotions, thoughts and the

inner wrestlings that I have not been able to control.

A book that I had picked up at the beginning of my Sabbatical called 'An Invitation to Solitude and Silence' by Ruth Haley Barton. In this book, Ruth describes herself 'like a jar of river water all shaken up. What you need is to sit still long enough that the sediment can settle and the water can become clear.'

I can't avoid the realization that I too am this jar of shaken up water and the jar was full of busyness, the emotions, the thoughts, the inner wrestlings that I had not been able to control. An invitation to be still and know, beyond my addiction to noise, words, people and performance-orientated activity.

I decided I would use this opportunity of Sabbatical to go on a silent retreat to St Bueno's in North Wales. God's invitation to move beyond words into solitude and silence.

Solitude eventually offers a quiet gift of grace, a gift that comes whenever we are able to face ourselves honestly: the gift of acceptance, of compassion, for who we are as we are. As we allow ourselves to be known in solitude, we discover that we are known by love. Beyond the pain of self-discovery there is a love that does not condemn us but calls us to itself. This love reaches us as we are.

One of the special places on that retreat were the most amazing sunrises and sunsets. Half way up the mountain, overlooking the beautiful countryside horizon, with the hills and valleys and the sea in the distance. The quite place of contemplating the colours and the changing clouds and the gloriousness to behold.

One thing I really appreciate about the sunrise each day is the gentleness of how the sun rises. It's not like a switch is flipped and the full light of day floods our homes, startling us out of our sleep. The sun rises slowly, peacefully, urging us to have hope for this new day.

As I read the scripture for today, I am mindful that Zechariah has been silent and it's with these words recorded in Luke 1: 68-79 how he chooses to break the silence. If you remember the story, the elderly Zechariah couldn't speak until John was born because he doubted the angel's announcement that he and his likewise elderly wife Elizabeth would have a child.

I wonder if he too had found the time to watch and contemplate. I'd always thought it was an act of punishment, but now I wonder if it was a gift after-all.

And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways, to give knowledge of salvation to his people by the forgiveness of their sins. By the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high will break upon us, to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace. Luke 1:76-79 (NRSV)

Maybe you've had a special sunrise experience, too. Sunrise is a familiar metaphor, one often used to show the start of something new. In the Bible, the priest Zechariah recognized a "sunrise" moment when his son, John the Baptist, was born.

When John was born, Zechariah prophesied about this child's role in making people ready for the "mighty saviour" Jesus, who would come through King David's descendants.

John the Baptist would make the people ready for the glory of God with us through Jesus' arrival. God showed his mercy by gently moving people toward the possibility that true worship could be more than following the legalistic customs of the day.

Just as the sunrise begins slowly, with just a glimmer, so John the Baptist was that glimmer of God's mercy and peace to those who were without hope, sitting "in darkness and in the shadow of death."

I find it a challenge to protect space for these times apart to stop and watch and listen to the still small voice. Especially in the commercialised busyness of Christmas. But I don't want to be so busy that I don't have moments to stop, pause and recognise the ever-loving presence of God. Life is busy and complicated and loud for many of us.

Beyond words. If I could encourage us to do one thing this week during Advent, it would be to find space and protect it to allow God to come and do for us what we cannot do for ourselves.

The next time you're awake for a sunrise, think of God's gentle mercy that moves all of us toward the way of peace and hope. Watch with patience for that glimmer of light on the horizon, see the pinks and yellows grow, and notice how the birds lift their morning songs of praise.

As we enter into this new week, may you take time to pause to be still; Let us remember the hope of Jesus' ultimate return and recognize God's gentle, peaceful guidance each day. Amen.
